

The Relevance of German Housing Co-operatives

Housing counts for ca. one third of the overall energy consumption in D F

- > Federal efforts on emission reduction via new buildings & renovation > challenge for all housing companies (GDW 2012: 2f.)

Consumption patterns related to "Housing" Energy & general consumption, daily routines & leasure patterns

Public/ Political Expectations: Housing co-ops with their specific understanding of economic sustainability so In general and in the context of social housing

- German Co-ops as middle-class phenomenon
- Growing public popularity of Solidarity
- Majority of small housing Co-ops, new ones
- are ecologically & socially conscious
- Limited participation of the members
- Information gap
- Co-operative movement and
- academic research focusses on
- economic & legal aspects
